President's Final Report

Why I wanted to be president of the BCTEA



I ran for president of the BCTEA for one reason, and that was to influence the direction that I thought Technology Education should go. I had goals. The main one being getting more funding for our shops and the second showing the value that access to

shop programs can have in meeting the skilled trade shortage. I tried many different avenues to achieve my goals with the first by working with the Career Education Society being a regional director for Vancouver We have received millions of dollars; the most notable is the Youth Capital Equipment grants to the tune of over 15 million. Additionally, the \$100 per student shop teachers receives to run skills exploration classes. But there has been one trend that I saw that needed attention. That was/is Train in Trades and Trade Sampler students coming out of our shop classes and going to college programs. We would often lose our top students to these post-secondary programs. I could see that this would erode the value of shop class. There needed to be some connection to shop class. Thus I worked at and still do, see Trade

Island and then stepping up to Vice President. In that capacity I created a close connection with staff on the Ministry of Education and the Industry Training Authority. I quickly learned that the Ministry of Education was there to guide what we teach, but it was the ITA that had the dollars. The

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challenge was how to direct some of the dollars heading for post-secondary (which there seems to be a lot more than ministry) down to where kids get a start and interest in skills for the trades. Once I had the connections it was obvious to me that the best way I could effect change was to become president of the BCTEA.
